Festival to Launch with *Our Patch* Exhibition
Featuring Never-Before-Seen Materials from ONE Archives at the USC Libraries

Los Angeles Times' "Our Queerest Century" Plenary Highlights Groundbreaking Retrospective on Queer History

Los Angeles, CA (July 10, 2024) — One Institute announced today the headlining exhibition *Our Patch: LGBTQ+ Life from Cradle to Grave* and opening plenary "Our Queerest Century: A Conversation with the *Los Angeles Times*" for the Circa:

Queer Histories Festival 2024. These events will be part of the LGBTQ+ History Month festival, which this year will feature over 60 programs at venues across Los Angeles throughout October.

Showcasing never-before-seen materials from newly-cataloged collections at ONE Archives at the USC Libraries, *Our Patch: LGBTQ+ Life from Cradle to Grave* is One Institute's tribute to the diverse yet deeply intertwined histories of LGBTQ+ community care and movement-building in Los Angeles. Co-curated by USC Roski School of Design professor Andy Campbell, interdisciplinary artist Jessica Carolina González, and Curatorial Practices and the Public Sphere M.A. candidate Robert Brady, the archival ephemera on display — including photographs, videos, oral histories, printed matter, correspondence, and artist books — provides insight into the multifaceted organizing strategies and care practices undertaken by LGBTQ+ activists at every stage of life, from youth to old age.

The exhibition will open with a ticketed reception on **Sunday, September 29, 2024, 5-8 p.m. at the Los Angeles LGBT Center's Advocate & Gochis Galleries**. The reception will begin with an exclusive VIP hour and will open to General Admission ticketholders from 6-8 p.m. The opening reception will offer exclusive walk-throughs with the curators and a special performance. Many of this year's participating artists, activists, and community leaders will also be in attendance. The exhibition will be on view to the public September 29-October 31, 2024. VIP and General Admission tickets will go on sale in September.

In addition to the exhibition, Circa's first week of programming will feature "Our Queerest Century: A Conversation with the Los Angeles Times," an opening plenary discussing The Times' groundbreaking retrospective of the last 100 years of queer politics, life, and culture, published in June 2024. Moderated by Times staff writer Kevin Rector, the panel will feature a discussion with writers who contributed to the project, delving into their pieces and reflecting on the exceptional contributions of LGBTQ+ people through history. The plenary will also cover the findings of a national poll on American perceptions of LGBTQ+ people, conducted by NORC at the University of Chicago with funding from The California Endowment, which was published as part of the project, and highlights the current political landscape for queer people ahead of a critical November election.

The opening plenary will be held at the Los Angeles LGBT Center's Renberg Theater on **Friday**, **October 4**, **2024**, **8-9:30 p.m**., followed by a reception with the panelists in the Center's courtyard.

"Circa's featured exhibition, *Our Patch,* reminds us of the hard-won battles to create impactful systems of care among LGBTQ+ communities when few others were addressing our critical needs," said Tony Valenzuela, Executive Director. "Meanwhile, the opening plenary, in an exciting collaboration with the *LA Times*, will dive into the past century of queer contributions to society while zeroing in on current attitudes

towards us at a time when an emboldened right wing seeks to reverse many of the gains we've made unless we beat them at the polls this November."

The full lineup for the Circa: Queer Histories Festival will be announced in September.

Debuting in 2023 to celebrate LGBTQ+ History Month, **Circa** is the first and only festival of its kind in the United States, attracting thousands of attendees. At this year's festival, attendees will once again be immersed in the world of queer artists, writers, filmmakers, activists, and community organizations as they explore queerness in the past, present and future.

Our Patch: LGBTQ+ Life from Cradle to Grave is organized by One Institute and copresented by the Los Angeles LGBT Center. 
